

## GlobalFest promises bigger blast

GlobalFest enthusiasts are being promised a bigger bang for their bucks this summer with a quartet of international fireworks manufacturers blasting city skies.

Fireworks producers representing the U.K., Spain, Italy and Hong Kong will face off at Elliston Park in what organizers are calling a coming-of-age in the bash's third year.

"This event is known interna-

classic pyro-musicals," said Martin Landy, director of the International Fireworks Competition.

Pyrotechnics straight from the factory floor will serve up explosive spectaculars kept under wraps until the Aug. 24-Sept. 1 competition, said Landy.

"The companies we hired build their own shells and there's a huge difference in the variety, styles and intensity," he said.

"These are fireworks never seen in the world before."

Fireworks, said he was impressed with the Elliston Park venue.

"It looks very promising because it's a natural amphitheatre — it gives us great liberty to do stuff that in a smaller area's not possible," said Alain Carbonneau.

He said the young competition is already "at the top of the list" internationally because of its excellent organization.
